1.0 INTRODUCTION

SEASOFT consists of modular menu driven routines for acquisition, display, processing, and archiving of oceanographic data acquired with Sea-Bird equipment and is designed to work with an IBM personal computer XT/AT/386/486 or compatible.

In order to enhance data integrity, raw data is acquired from the instruments and stored as raw unmodified data. A conversion program DATCNV uses the instrument configuration and calibration coefficients to create a converted engineering unit data file (.CNV) that is operated on by all SEASOFT post processing modules. Each SEASOFT module that modifies the converted data file adds information to the header of the converted file permitting tracking of how the various oceanographic parameters were obtained.

2.0 BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF SEASOFT MODULES

Acquisition, Playback, and Conversion of Raw Data to Engineering Units:

3.0 SOFTWARE INSTALLATION

SEASOFT requires approximately 4 Mbytes of disk space during installation. Make sure there is room on your disk before proceeding.

1. Make a directory for the SEASOFT executable files and copy all of the SEASOFT disks to this directory. for example, type

cd \ md seasoft cd seasoft insert SEASOFT disk 1 in drive a: copy a:*.* insert SEASOFT disk 2 in drive a: copy a:*.*

- 2. Type sinstall at the DOS prompt to uncompress the SEASOFT files.
- Make a directory for your configuration and data files. for example type cd \ md ctddata
- 4. Add the seasoft directory to the PATH statement in your autoexec.bat file.
- 5. In your config.sys file set: buffers=20 (or more)

files = 20 (or more)

If you are using an SBE 11 deck unit with IEEE-488 (GPIB) interface your config.sys file should also contain the line:

device=gpib.com

You can copy the GPIB.COM file from the SEASOFT directory to the root directory (the GPIB configuration is shown in the next section) or you can use the IBCONFIG utility that came with your GPIB interface to configure GPIB.COM.

6. If you are using a color graphic adapter with a monochrome display (i.e. most laptop computers) a better display will result if the DOS command MODE BW80 is run before running any of the SEASOFT modules. This command can be inserted in your autoexec.bat. MODE.COM is included in the SEASOFT disks but you may want to run the version that came with the version of DOS that is installed on your computer.

The terminal programs can be run from floppy disk based computers to set up and upload data from internally recording instruments. The data processing programs require a hard disk based system.

3.2 SOFTWARE DEMO

For a quick look at a demo data set change to the SEASOFT subdirectory and run the program SEASAVE. Example - C:\SEASOFT > seasave

- 1. From the Main Menu select "Display Archived Data"
- 2. The menu should contain the following:

To change entries, use arrow keys to move highlighted cursor bar to the item you want to change and press the "enter" key. A sub-menu will open to show what other choices are available. Move the cursor bar to the desired item and press "enter" to select it.

- 3. DEMO.CON contains the configuration and calibration coefficients for the demo data file. If SEASOFT.CON is included on the disk it will contain the configuration and calibration coefficients for your instrument. Do not choose SEASOFT.CON to view the demo data.
- 4. There are two display files, DEMO.DSP and DEMOFEAT.DSP. For the first demonstration, select DEMO.DSP.
- 5. For now, do not modify the Variables to Display or Misc. X-Y Plot Parameters.
- 6. Enter the number of scans to skip over in the data file = 0
- 7. Enter number of scans to skip between computations = 4 (for maximum graphical resolution choose 0 (but it takes longer to print to the screen).
- 8. To view the data, press F10. Space Bar halts (and resumes) plotting. CTL-F1 will quit display and return to menu.
- 9. To look at a portion of the profile in greater detail, select the display file DEMOFEAT.DSP. Set the number of scans to skip over in the data file = 300, and the number of scans to skip between computations = 0.
- 10. Press F10 to view data.

11. When you press escape to go back to the Main Menu, and then press escape to exit the program, you will be have a choice to do one of the following:

a) overwrite the .DSP file most recently selectedb) write to a new file

c) quit without saving

To save a display configuration you have created by modifying an existing .DSP file, choose b and enter a new filename.

12. Refer to the manual for instructions on using the other modules.

4.0 FILE FORMATS

File extensions are used by SEASOFT modules to indicate the file type.

4.1 FILE EXTENSION DEFINITIONS:

- ASC The data portion of a .CNV converted data file written in ASCII by ASCIIOUT, or files written by TERM37.
- BL Created by SEASAVE when a bottle fire confirmation is received. Contains bottle sequence number, position, date, time, beginning and ending scan numbers.
- BTL Created by ROSSUM. This is a summary of the data in a .ROS file
- BSR Bottle scan range file, used by DATCNV to create a .ROS file.
- CFG Used by SEASOFT modules to store the input filename, input data path, output data path, and other miscellaneous module specific parameters.
- CTR Density contour file generated by CONTOUR.
- CNV 'Converted' engineering unit data file. An ASCII header precedes the data.
- CON Contains instrument configuration and calibration coefficients, used by SEACON, SEASAVE, and DATCNV.
- DAT Raw binary data, optionally with header information (SBE 9/11, 11X, 9/11*plus*, and data files created with previous versions of SEASOFT).
- DSP Used by SEASAVE to store data acquisition and display parameters
- HDR 1) Header portion of a .CNV converted data file written by ASCIIOUT.2) Header recorded when acquiring real time data or uploading archived data.
- HEX Raw HEX data with header information (SBE 16, 17, 19, 21, and 25).
- MRK Marker file created by SEASAVE during real time data acquisition.
- PLT Used by SEAPLOT to store display parameters.
- ROS Scans marked with the bottle fire confirmation bit, or defined by a .BSR file, written by DATCNV.

SEASOFT modules search the current directory for DSP, PLT, and CFG files. SEASOFT modules search the 'input data path' for CON, HEX, DAT, and CNV files. One exception is SEACON which searches the current directory for CON files.

4.2 CONVERTED DATA FILE FORMAT:

Converted data files (CNV extension) consist of a descriptive header followed by converted data in engineering units. The header contains header information from the raw input data file followed by entries that describe the number of rows and columns of data, a description of each column, the interval between each row (scan rate or bin size), and a historical record of the processing steps that were used to create or modify the data file. The converted data is stored in either rows and columns of ASCII numbers (11 characters per value) or as a binary data stream with each value stored as a 4 byte binary floating point number. The last data column is a flag field used to mark scans as good or bad.

Header lines beginning with '*' contain header information copied from the raw input data file. Header lines beginning with '#' contain information describing the converted data file. The ASCII string "*END*" flags the end of the header information.

SEASOFT modules process binary data files much faster than ASCII data files. The ASCII files can be examined and modified with any text editor.

Each SEASOFT module that modifies a .CNV file adds information to the header and updates the nquan, nvalues, name n, span n, interval, and file type entries when appropriate.

5.0 SAMPLE DATA PROCESSING STEPS

The following examples assume that SEACON has been run to create a .CON file containing the instrument configuration and sensor calibration coefficients.

Oxygen values computed by SEASAVE and DATCNV will be somewhat different from oxygen values computed by DERIVE. This is because the oxygen algorithm uses the parameter doc/dt (the derivative of oxygen current with respect to time). SEASAVE and DATCNV compute this parameter looking backwards in time since they share common code and SEASAVE can not use future values of oxygen current while acquiring data in real time. DERIVE uses a centered window (equal number of points before and after the scan) to obtain a better estimate of doc/dt. SEASAVE and DATCNV can be used to obtain a quick look of oxygen values, DERIVE should be used to obtain the most accurate oxygen computations.

5.1 MINIMUM PROCESSING OF CTD DATA

- 1. Acquire the raw data with SEASAVE or the appropriate terminal program.
- 2. DATCNV Convert the raw data to pressure, temperature, conductivity and parameters obtained from auxiliary sensors such as dissolved oxygen concentration, and light transmission. Also include derived oceanographic parameters such as salinity, density, and sound velocity. Select ASCII as the data conversion format.

5.2 STANDARD PROCESSING OF PUMPED SBE 19 CTD DATA

WITHOUT OXYGEN:

- 1. Acquire the raw data with SEASAVE or the appropriate terminal program.
- 2. DATCNV Convert the raw data to pressure, temperature, conductivity and parameters obtained from auxiliary sensors such as light transmission, pH, and fluorescence.
- 3. FILTER Force conductivity to have the same response as temperature. Low pass filter conductivity with a time constant of approximately 0.5 seconds. Filter pressure with a time constant of 2 seconds to increase pressure resolution for LOOPEDIT.
- 4. ALIGNCTD Advance temperature relative to pressure approximately 0.5 seconds.

- 5. LOOPEDIT Mark scans where the CTD is moving less than the minimum velocity or travelling backwards due to ship roll.
- 6. BINAVG Average data into the desired pressure or depth bins.
- 7. DERIVE Compute salinity, density, and other oceanographic parameters

WITH OXYGEN:

- 1. Acquire the raw data with SEASAVE or the appropriate terminal program.
- 2. DATCNV Convert the raw data to pressure, temperature, conductivity and parameters obtained from auxiliary sensors such as dissolved oxygen current, dissolved oxygen temperature, and light transmission.
- 3. FILTER Force conductivity to have the same response as temperature. Low pass filter conductivity with a time constant of approximately 0.5 seconds. Filter pressure with a time constant of 2 seconds to increase pressure resolution for LOOPEDIT.
- 4. ALIGNCTD Advance temperature approximately 0.5 seconds and oxygen 3 to 7 seconds relative to pressure.
- 5. LOOPEDIT Mark scans where the CTD is moving less than the minimum velocity or travelling backwards due to ship roll.
- 6. DERIVE Compute oxygen from oxygen current, oxygen temperature, temperature and pressure.
- 7. BINAVG Average data into the desired pressure or depth bins.
- 8. DERIVE Compute salinity, density, and other oceanographic parameters

5.3 STANDARD PROCESSING OF UNPUMPED SBE 19 CTD DATA

WITHOUT OXYGEN:

- 1. Acquire the raw data with SEASAVE or the appropriate terminal program.
- 2. DATCNV Convert the raw data to pressure, temperature, conductivity and parameters obtained from auxiliary sensors such as light transmission, pH, and fluorescence.
- 3. FILTER Force conductivity to have the same response as temperature. Low pass filter conductivity with a time constant of approximately 0.5 seconds. Filter pressure with a time constant of 2 seconds to increase pressure resolution for LOOPEDIT.
- 4. ALIGNCTD Advance temperature relative to pressure approximately 0.6 seconds. This value will depend on the lowering rate.
- 5. LOOPEDIT Mark scans where the CTD is moving less than the minimum velocity or travelling backwards due to ship roll.
- 6. BINAVG Average data into the desired pressure or depth bins.
- 7. DERIVE Compute salinity, density, and other oceanographic parameters

WITH OXYGEN:

- 1. Acquire the raw data with SEASAVE or the appropriate terminal program.
- 2. DATCNV Convert the raw data to pressure, temperature, conductivity and parameters obtained from auxiliary sensors such as dissolved oxygen current, dissolved oxygen temperature, and light transmission.

- 3. FILTER Force conductivity to have the same response as temperature. Low pass filter conductivity with a time constant of approximately 0.5 seconds. Filter pressure with a time constant of 2 seconds to increase pressure resolution for LOOPEDIT.
- 4. ALIGNCTD Advance temperature approximately 0.6 seconds and oxygen 1 to 5 seconds relative to pressure. These values will depend on the lowering rate and the oxygen sensor response time.
- 5. LOOPEDIT Mark scans where the CTD is moving less than the minimum velocity or travelling backwards due to ship roll.
- 6. DERIVE Compute oxygen from oxygen current, oxygen temperature, temperature and pressure.
- 7. BINAVG Average data into the desired pressure or depth bins.
- 8. DERIVE Compute salinity, density, and other oceanographic parameters

5.4 STANDARD PROCESSING OF SBE 25 CTD DATA

WITHOUT OXYGEN:

- 1. Acquire the raw data with SEASAVE or the appropriate terminal program.
- 2. DATCNV Convert the raw data to pressure, temperature, conductivity and parameters obtained from auxiliary sensors such as dissolved oxygen current, dissolved oxygen temperature, and light transmission.
- 3. FILTER Low pass filter pressure with a time constant of 0.5 seconds to increase pressure resolution for LOOPEDIT.
- 4. LOOPEDIT Mark scans where the CTD is moving less than the minimum velocity or travelling backwards due to ship roll.
- 5. BINAVG Average data into the desired pressure or depth bins.
- 6. DERIVE Compute salinity, density, and other oceanographic parameters

WITH OXYGEN:

- 1. Acquire the raw data with SEASAVE or the appropriate terminal program.
- 2. DATCNV Convert the raw data to pressure, temperature, conductivity and parameters obtained from auxiliary sensors such as dissolved oxygen current, dissolved oxygen temperature, and light transmission.
- 3. ALIGNCTD Advance oxygen 1 to 5 seconds relative to pressure. These values will depend on the lowering rate and the oxygen sensor response time.
- 4. FILTER Low pass filter pressure with a time constant of 0.5 seconds to increase pressure resolution for LOOPEDIT.
- 5. LOOPEDIT Mark scans where the CTD is moving less than the minimum velocity or travelling backwards due to ship roll.
- 6. DERIVE Compute oxygen from oxygen current, oxygen temperature, temperature and pressure.
- 7. BINAVG Average data into the desired pressure or depth bins.
- 8. DERIVE Compute salinity, density, and other oceanographic parameters

5.5 STANDARD PROCESSING OF SBE 9/11 CTD DATA

The following data processing steps assume that the SBE 11 Deck Unit has been set to correctly advance conductivity relative to pressure (1.75 scans or 0.073 seconds) for SBE 9/11 and SBE 911*plus* systems with a TC duct. The program ALIGNCTD can be used to verify that the deck unit correct by adding positive and negative advances to conductivity and observing the effect salinity and density computed by DERIVE.

Notes:

SBE 911plus systems should not have any 'wild' data points. This data processing step may be skipped.

FILTER can be run before CELLTM to remove any residual response time between the temperature and conductivity sensors and to minimize digitization noise. On average, a low pass filter with a time constant of 0.03 sec reduces the noise in computed salinity slightly. A low pass filter with a time constant can be used to smooth the pressure data. This can be useful when examining full rate (24 scans per second) fine structure data on pressure scales of 10 meters or less.

CELLTM needs to be run only if salinity accuracies of better that 0.01 PSU in regions with steep gradients are desired.

SEAPLOT can be used to display the data at any point after DATCNV has been run. ASCIIOUT is useful for exporting converted data to other computers or other processing software.

5.6 BATCH FILE PROCESSING

The easiest way to process data using a batch file is:

First run each module and enter the desired choices in the set up forms. When the form is complete press Esc to exit the module. The module configuration will be stored in the current directory as MODULENAME.CFG.

Once the module configurations have been written create a batch file to process the data. One example is:

- line 1: datcnv -ihu112
- line 2: alignetd -ihu112
- line 3: loopedit -ihu112
- line 4: binavg -ihu112 -ohu112avg
- line 5: derive -ihu112avg

Line 1 converts HU112.DAT or HU112.HEX and writes the converted file to HU112.CNV.

Line 2 aligns HU112.CNV and writes out the aligned file to HU112.CNV.

Line 3 loopedits HU112.CNV and writes out the edited file to HU112.CNV.

Line 4 averages HU112.CNV and writes out the averaged file to HU112AVG.CNV.

Line 5 computes derived parameters using HU112AVG.CNV and writes out the input data plus the derived data edited file to HU112AVG.CNV.

If you want to be able to interrupt the batch processing modify the batch file as follows:

- line 1: datcnv -ihu112
- line 2: if errorlevel 1 goto abort
- line 3: alignetd -ihu112
- line 4: if errorlevel 1 goto abort
- line 5: loopedit -ihu112
- line 6: if errorlevel 1 goto abort
- line 7: binavg -ihu112 -ohu112avg
- line 8: if errorlevel 1 goto abort
- line 9: derive -ihu112avg

line 10:if errorlevel 1 goto abortline 11:goto endline 12::abortline 13:echo batch process interrupted by userline 14::end

6.0 COMMAND LINE INPUT AND OUTPUT FILENAMES

When processing <u>all</u> data files (-a or -ax command line options) the input and output data paths stored in the module configuration file will be added to the filename. With the -a option the setup screen will be displayed and you will have the option of changing the input and output data paths before processing the files.

When specifying the input filenames (-i < filename > command line option):

If the filename does not contain a path specifier the input data path in the module configuration file is added to the filename.

If the filename contains a path specifier the input data path in the module configuration file is not used.

When specifying the output filenames (-o < filename > command line option):

If the filename does not contain a path specifier the output data path in the module configuration file is added to the filename.

If the filename contains a path specifier the output data path in the module configuration file is not used.

With the exception of SPLIT, the default output filename is the input filename.

If the output filename is the same as the input filename, the output file is first written to a temporary file. When processing is complete the input file is deleted and the temporary file is renamed to the input dat filename.

averages \ctddata\sta100\cast5.cnv and writes out the averaged data to \ctddata\sta112\cast5.cnv The input data file will not be overwritten.

binavg -i\ctddata\sta100\cast5 -o\ctddata\sta100\avg\cast5

averages i:\ctddata\sta100\cast5.cnv and writes out the averaged data to i:\ctddata\sta100\avg\cast5.cnv The input data file will not be overwritten.

7.0 PROMPTS COMMON TO ALL SEASOFT MODULES

Input Data File =

When the Enter Key is pressed a list of the files in the directory specified by the Input File Path will be displayed. Use the arrow keys or a mouse to highlight the desired file. Pressing the Enter Key will select the file. Pressing the Esc Key will return you to the main menu without selecting the file.

Input File [] Path =

Specifies where the module looks for the input file. The extensions inside the square brackets identify the filename extensions that are included in the input file path specification.

Output Data File Path =

Specifies the path and directory where the output data file will be written.

If you wish to read and write from the current directory enter the disk drive letter as the input and output file path.

8.0 DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF SEASOFT MODULES

8.1 ALIGNCTD

Description:

ALIGNCTD aligns temperature, conductivity and oxygen measurements in time relative to pressure. This ensures that calculations of salinity, dissolved oxygen concentration, and other parameters are made using measurements from the same parcel of water. ALIGNCTD can not be run on converted data files that have been averaged into pressure or depth bins.

The measurements can be misaligned for 3 principal reasons:

- a) the sensors are physically misaligned in depth,
- b) the inherent time delay (time constants) of sensor responses, and
- c) the water transit time delay in the pumped plumbing line (or the corresponding flushing delay in free-flushing sensors that depends on profiling speed).

When measurements are properly aligned, salinity spiking (and density) errors are minimized, and oxygen data corresponds to the proper pressure (e.g. temperature vs oxygen plots agree between down and up profiles).

Entries for secondary sensors are ignored if the secondary sensors are not included in the data file.

Number of Seconds to Advance Conductivity Relative to Pressure: Number of Seconds to Advance Temperature Relative to Pressure:

Temperature (and conductivity) profiles are often systematically separated in depth between the upcast and downcast. The causes are lags in the temperature (and conductivity) sensor response and hysteresis in the pressure measurement. These can be compensated by shifting temperature and conductivity relative to pressure. Because the SBE 19 uses a temperature sensor with a relatively slow time constant a typical correction for the SBE 19 PROFILER is an advance temperature relative to pressure of +0.5 seconds. Because the time response of the SBE 3 temperature is fast (0.06 seconds) it is not necessary to advance temperature relative to pressure to pressure for the SBE 9 and SBE 25.

For a given sensor configuration the conductivity measurement may lead or lag that of temperature. This is especially true of SBE 19 PROFILER data where the flushing rate of the conductivity cell depends on drop speed. If the profiler is lowered slowly, conductivity structure will lag temperature structure, while if it is lowered fast it will lead temperature. For an SBE 19 PROFILER the advance of conductivity relative to temperature will range from 0 seconds at a lowering rate of 0.75 meters per second (0.75 decibars per second) to -0.6 seconds for 2 meters per second.

For an SBE 9 CTD with ducted temperature and conductivity sensors and a 3000 rpm pump the typical <u>net</u> advance of conductivity relative to temperature is 0.073 seconds. If the SBE 11 is set to advance the primary conductivity 3 scans (3/24 seconds) the nominal value to advance conductivity relative to temperature with ALIGNCTD is -0.52 seconds (3/24 - 0.052 = 0.073 seconds). If the SBE 11 is set to advance the primary conductivity 1.75 scans (factory setting for the SBE 11plus) the nominal value to advance conductivity relative to temperature with ALIGNCTD is 0.00 seconds (1.75/24 = 0.073 seconds). The SBE 11 and 11plus deck units do not advance the secondary conductivity.

Note that if temperature is advanced relative to pressure and you do not want to change the relative timing of temperature and conductivity you must add the same advance to conductivity.

The best diagnostic of proper alignment is the elimination of salinity spikes that coincide with very sharp temperature steps. To determine the best alignment plot 10 meters of temperature and salinity data at a very sharp temperature step. For the down trace, when the mean gradients are positive (temperature and salinity increasing upward) a negative salinity spike at the temperature step means that conductivity leads temperature (the conductivity sensor "sees" the step before the temperature sensor does) and you will need to advance conductivity relative to temperature a **negative** number of seconds. Conversely if the salinity spikes are positive, advance conductivity relative to temperature a positive number of seconds. The best alignment is obtained when the salinity spikes are minimized.

Some experimentation with different advances will be required to find the best alignment.

When using free flushing conductivity sensors, we recommend that the profiling speed be kept greater than 0.7 meters per second because of thermal contamination of the conductivity measurement at lower speeds.

Example (typical of SBE 19 data):

If we wish to advance conductivity 0.2 seconds relative to temperature and we wish to advance temperature +0.5 seconds relative to pressure. We would enter:

Num seconds to advance conductivity relative to pressure = 0.7Num seconds to advance temperature relative to pressure = 0.5

Number of Seconds to Advance Oxygen Relative to Pressure:

Oxygen data are also systematically delayed with respect to depth. The two primary reasons are the long time constant of the oxygen sensor (ranging from 2 seconds at 25 C to about 5 seconds at 0 C) and an additional delay from the transit time of water in the pumped plumbing line. As with temperature and conductivity, this delay is compensated by shifting oxygen data relative to pressure. If 0 is entered the relative timing between oxygen and the remaining parameters is not changed. A typical correction for the SBE 19 PROFILER is an advance of +6 seconds, and for the SBE 9 CTD it is an advance of about +3 seconds.

The flag column and scans with the flag column marked 'bad' can be suppressed from the output. If 'Label Output Columns' is set to YES the top of each column will be labeled. Values set to bad_flag by WILDEDIT are not included in the average. If the number of points included in the average is zero the average value is set to bad flag.

If Exclude Scans Marked Bad = NO all scans are considered 'good'.

The center value of the first bin is set equal to the bin size.

Scan Number or Time Bins:

N = scans per bin N = bin size; bin type = scans N = bin size / interval; bin type = secondsN = bin size * 3600 / interval; bin type = hours

If the bin type is scans N 'good' scans are averaged.

If the bin type is seconds or hours N scans are read; only the scans marked 'good' are included in the average.

Pressure Bins (No Interpolation):

Scans with pressure > BinMin and pressure <= BinMax are added to the average. If pressure > BinMax the sums are divided by the number of points and the averages are written to the output file. The center value for the next bin is then computed and the values for the scan are added to the next bin.

If Exclude Scans Marked Bad = YES, scans with the flag field set to bad_flag (by LOOPEDIT) are skipped over. One exception is the surface bin which will always include these values.

Pressure Bins (with interpolation):

For each bin:

BinMin = center value - binSize / 2 BinMax = center value + binSize / 2

Scans with pressure > BinMin and pressure <= BinMax are added to the average. If pressure > BinMax the sums are divided by the number of points and the interpolation is done as follows:

- $P_{P} =$ average pressure of the previous bin

- $P_c =$ average pressure of the current bin
- X_{c} = average value of the variable in the current bin
- $P_i = target or center value for pressure in the bin$

Xⁱ = interpolated value for the variable (value it would have at the center pressure)

 $X_i = ((X_c - X_p) * (P_i - P_p) / (P_c - P_p)) + X_p$

The interpolated values are computed and stored in the output file.

Interpolated values for the first bin are computed after the averages for the second bin are calculated. In this case the target is first set to the center of the first bin. The interpolated values for the first bin are calculated and stored. The target is then set to the center of the second bin. The interpolated values for the second bin are then calculated and stored.

Depth Bins:

Depth bins are processed the same as pressure bins with interpolation except that the tests to determine whether the scan is in the bin are made on depth rather than pressure.

Include Surface Bin:

The Include Surface Bin flag is ignored when averaging is by scan or time bins.

If Include Surface Bin is set to NO the center of the first bin is set equal to the bin size.

Otherwise all scans with pressure values that are > surface minimum and $\langle =$ surface maximum are added to the surface bin. As soon as a scan is found with a pressure value > BinMin the surface values are averaged and this value is used as the first bin. The target for the surface bin is set to 0.0.

The first bin is the bin size. Use the -c command line option to change the center value of the first bin for pressure or depth bins. For example if the bin size is 10 decibars:

first bin = 10 decibars, includes data greater than 5 db and less than or equal to 15 db. second bin = 20 decibars, includes data greater than 15 db and less than or equal to 25 db. third bin = 30 decibars, includes data greater than 25 db and less than or equal to 35 db.

If binavg -c5 is entered to start BINAVG the center of the first bin is set to 5 decibars:

first bin = 5 decibars, includes data greater than 0 db and less than or equal to 10 db. second bin = 15 decibars, includes data greater than 10 db and less than or equal to 20 db. third bin = 25 decibars, includes data greater than 20 db and less than or equal to 30 db. The input .CNV file must have been processed with BINAVG on pressure bins and must contain pressure, temperature, and either salinity or conductivity. The relationship between BUOYANCY (Brunt-Väisälä) frequency N and stability E is:

The algorithm used to compute N^2 for the pressure value centered in the window is:

1. Compute averages:

BUOYANCY converts the window size from decibars to scans based on the pressure interval between scans in the input file. If the window size is less than three scans BUOYANCY sets it to three scans. If the window size is an even number of scans BUOYANCY adds one scan to the window size. Example: If the interval between scans in the input file is 10 decibars, window sizes of 5, 10, and 20 decibars will result in a window size of three scans. Window sizes of 30, and 40 decibars will result in a window size of five scans.

The variable used in buoyancy computation can be latitude (BUOYANCY will estimate the local gravity from the latitude using the algorithm in UNESCO Technical Papers in Marine Science No. 44.) or user entered gravity.

The number of variables added to the .CNV file can be 0, 1, 2, 3, or 4. Highlight the Variables to be Derived field and press Enter to select the output variables.

In SEASOFT V 4.0 instrument configuration and calibration coefficients are stored in files with a .CON extension. Display parameters are stored separately.

Choose 'Scans Marked with Bottle Confirm Bit' from the menu if you are using an SBE 911plus with a water sampler (rosette) interface. In this case the bottle confirm bit will be set for 1.5 seconds when a confirmation is received from the rosette. You will be prompted for the offset and duration. The offset determines the first scan output to the .ROS file for the bottle. The duration determines the number of scans output to the .ROS file for the offset and duration are referenced to the first confirm bit for the bottle. For example if the scan rate is 24 scans per second, 36 scans in a row have the confirm bit set beginning with scan 10,000, offset = -2 seconds and duration = 5 seconds then scans 9,952 through 10,072 will be written to the .ROS file for this bottle.

If you are <u>not</u> using an SBE 911*plus* with a water sampler interface select 'Bottle Scan Range File [.BSR]' or 'Bottle Log File [BL.] as the source of scan range. DATCNV will read the .BSR or .BL file to determine the scans to output to the .ROS file.

If you are using an SBE 90208 Carousel Auto Fire Module select 'Auto-Fire Module File [.AFM]'. DATCNV will merge data from the .HEX file and .AFM file into the .ROS file. You will be prompted for the offset and duration. The offset is relative to the first scan recorded by the Auto-Fire Module (five scans before the bottle is tripped. The duration determines the number of scans output to the .ROS file for the bottle.

If you select Bottle Scan Range File [.BSR] or Bottle Log File[.BL] and bottle confirm bits are set in the raw data file, the data from the .BSR file will be used and the bottle confirm bits will be ignored.

If you have used the Mark Scan feature in SEASAVE during data acquisition to create a .MRK file you can use the module MARKSCAN to create a .BSR file from the .MRK file.

A Bottle Log file is created when bottles are fired and data is stored to disk.

8.10.3 DATCNV: NOTES

If you plan to do any post processing of the data select only the primary variables to be converted. Use the SEASOFT module DERIVE to compute derived oceanographic parameters such as salinity, density, sound velocity, oxygen, and dynamic height anomaly.

If you will use BINAVG with depth bins include depth in the output file.

If you will use BINAVG with pressure bins include pressure in the output file.

If you will use DERIVE to compute salinity, density, or other parameters that depend on salinity include pressure, temperature, and conductivity in the output file.

DATCNV was written to accommodate most if not all of the sensors that have been installed on Sea-Bird products. Consult the configuration page at the beginning of your hardware manual for the sensors that were installed in your system.

If you will use DERIVE to compute oxygen, include oxygen current and oxygen temperature in the output file along with pressure, temperature, and conductivity.

Pressure temperature is computed using a backward looking 30 second running average in order to prevent bit transitions in pressure temperature from causing small jumps in computed pressure. Because the heavily insulated pressure sensor has a thermal time constant on the order of one hour the 30 second average does not significantly alter the computed pressure temperature.

Oxygen values computed by SEASAVE and DATCNV will be somewhat different from oxygen values computed by DERIVE. This is because the oxygen algorithm uses the parameter doc/dt (the derivative of oxygen current with respect to time). SEASAVE and DATCNV compute this parameter looking backwards in time since they share common code and SEASAVE can not use future values of oxygen current while acquiring data in real time. DERIVE uses a centered window (equal number of points before and after the scan) to obtain a better estimate of doc/dt. SEASAVE and DATCNV can be used to obtain a quick look of oxygen values, DERIVE should be used to obtain the most accurate oxygen computations.

Oxygen sensors normally measure two parameters, oxygen membrane current and oxygen membrane temperature. In previous versions of SEASOFT oxygen was assigned to a data word while other sensors such as transmissometers were assigned to individual voltages. In SEASOFT there are two voltages in a data word. If oxygen were assigned to word 3, oxygen current voltage would appear on voltage 0 and oxygen temperature voltage would appear on voltage 1.

depth (salt water, fresh water)

dynamic meters

geopotential anomaly

potential temperature (reference pressure = 0.0 decibars)

potential temperature anomaly

salinity

sound velocity (Chen-Millero, DelGrosso, Wilson)

average sound velocity

specific volume anomaly

thermosteric anomaly

If the input converted data file has not been averaged into pressure or depth bins DERIVE can compute lowering rate and acceleration.

Oxygen will be added to the variable list if the input file has not been averaged into pressure or depth bins and the input file contains pressure, temperature and either conductivity or salinity.

Temperature used for derived variables is IPTS-68. Following the recommendation of JPOTS T₆₈ is assumed to be $1.00024 * T_{90}$ (-2 to 35 °C)

Temperature, pressure, and conductivity or salinity must be contained in the .ROS file. Lines beginning with a '*' or '#' are copied from the .ROS header. Bottle position, optional bottle serial number, and date/time are always output as the first columns. The derived variables are computed from the mean values of temperature, pressure and conductivity.

If a .BL file (same name as the input data file but with a .BL extension) is found in the input file path, ROSSUM will use the bottle position data from the .BL file.

If the file "BOTTLE.SN" is found in the current directory <u>or</u> a bottle serial number file is specified by the b < bottleSNfilename > command line option, bottle serial numbers are inserted between the bottle position and date/time. The format for the bottle serial number file is:

a comma separates the two fields.

If oxygen current and oxygen temperature are in the .ROS file, oxygen can be calculated. Doc/dt is a least squares fit to all the oxygen current data for each bottle. Oxygen is calculated using the mean values for temperature, pressure, and salinity, doc/dt, and the scan by scan values of oxygen current and oxygen temperature.

The maximum number of scans processed per bottle is 1440.

In order to conserve memory the SBE 25 has the ability to select the number of external voltages that are sampled. Once these external voltages have been selected they are mapped into stored voltages. In the context of this discussion the Stored voltages in the SEACON data format for the SBE 25 are the stored voltage numbers as reported in the SBE 25 display status reply. Consult the configuration page in your SBE 25 manual for additional information.

The number of external voltages and the data format must agree with how the SBE 25 has been programmed. Compare the SEACON setup with the display status reply from the instrument.

The firmware version lets SEASAVE and DATCNV know how to decode the HEX data from the instrument and can be determined from the configuration sheet in the instrument manual or from the display status reply from the instrument.

The real time data output rate is used to calculate elapsed time while acquiring real time data.

The SBE 33 Carousel Deck unit or SBE 36 CTD Deck Unit can be set up to add Latitude/Longitude and, or Surface PAR data to the HEX data stream from the SBE 19. Set these fields to correspond to the Deck Unit set up (set the fields to NO if an SBE 33 or SBE 36 Deck Unit is not being used).

8.17.9 SEACON: CHANGE CALIBRATION COEFFICIENTS

When finished editing the instrument configuration press the Esc key to return to the SEACON main menu and select Change Calibration Coefficients.

8.17.9.1 TEMPERATURE

For the temperature sensor(s) you will be prompted for the sensor serial number, f0, a, b, c, and d. Enter these values from the temperature sensor calibration sheet. The prompt for 'slope' and 'offset' allows you to make small corrections for temperature drift between calibrations. For newly calibrated sensors use slope = 1.0, offset = 0.0. The correction formula is:

(corrected temperature) = slope * (computed temperature) + offset

where slope = (true temperature span) / (instrument temperature span) offset = (true temperature - instrument reading) * slope; measured at 0.0 Celsius

As an example of computing the correction coefficients, if we had the following calibration data:

true temperature 0.0 C 25.0 C instrument reading 0.0015 C 25.0005 C slope = (25.0 - 0.0) / (25.0020 - 0.0015) = 1.000040002offset = (0.0 - 0.0015) * (1.000040001) = -0.001500060

If the span error is less than +/-0.01 then the following approximations are valid: (offset correction) = -(offset error), and (slope correction) = 1.0 / (1.0 + span error).

The Sea-Bird temperature sensors usually drift by changing offset. Changes are typically toward higher temperature with time for sensors with serial numbers < 1050 and toward lower temperature with time for serial numbers > 1050. Many years of experience with hundreds of sensors indicates that the drift is smooth and uniform with time allowing users to make very accurate corrections based only on pre- and post-cruise laboratory calibrations. Calibration checks at-sea are advisable to insure against sensor malfunction, however, data from reversing thermometers is rarely accurate enough to make calibration corrections that are better than those possible by shore-based laboratory calibrations.

The temperature sensors rarely exhibit span errors larger than 0.005 C over the range -5 to 35 C even after years of drift. A span error that increases by more than +/- 0.0002 [C per C per year] is symptomatic of sensor malfunction. However in the past, some calibrations have been delivered that include span errors up to 0.004 C in 30 C (span error of 0.000133) (approximately zero error at 15 C) because of undetected systematic errors in calibration.

Sea-Bird Application Note 31 discusses how to compute slope and offset correction coefficients from preand post-cruise calibrations supplied by Sea-Bird (NRCC).

8.17.9.2 CONDUCTIVITY

For conductivity sensor(s) you will be prompted for the sensor serial number, calibration date, and coefficients m, a, b, c, and d. Enter these values from the conductivity sensor calibration sheet. You can also change the values for 'cpcor', 'slope', and 'offset'. Typical default values are:

cpcor = -9.57e-08slope = 1.0 offset = 0.0

'cpcor' corrects for the compression of the cell while 'slope' and 'offset' correct for sensor drift between calibrations. An explanation of these coefficients and how to compute alternate values follows.

The 'cpcor' coefficient makes a correction for the highly consistent change in dimensions of the conductivity cell under pressure. For almost all conductivity cells and sensor applications use the default value, cpcor = -9.57e-8. Previous to Seasoft Version 4.209 'cpcor' was "hidden" in software and set to the compressibility coefficient for borosilicate glass (cpcor = -9.57e-8) in accord with the behavior of most cells.

From Version 4.209 forward 'cpcor' is variable to accommodate the discovery that **some** of the conductivity sensors fabricated between 1992 and 1995 exhibit a compression that is slightly less than pure borosilicate glass. For these sensors the (hermetic) epoxy jacket on the glass cell is unintentionally strong and the cell exhibits a composite pressure effect of borosilicate **and** epoxy. For all sensors measured to date the composite pressure coefficient ranges between -9.57e-8 and -6.90e-8. The most extreme composite pressure coefficient produces a correction to deep ocean salinity which is different from pure borosilicate glass by a magnitude of 0.0057 PSU in 5000 dbars pressure.

Before choosing 'cpcor' different from the default value, first confirm that your conductivity sensor has a serial number in the range 1100 to 1500 **and** behaves differently from pure borosilicate glass. A test of your cell can be performed at Sea-Bird where the actual value of 'cpcor' can also be measured. Alternately it is possible to test cells at sea where the computed salinity from a conductivity sensor is checked against the salinity of water samples from a range of depths. With very high precision Autosal work a linear error in salinity of typically less than 0.001 PSU per 1000 dbars can be detected and corrected by changing the coefficient 'cpcor'. For help or more information please contact Sea-Bird.

The coefficients 'slope' and 'offset' allow you to make small corrections for sensor drift between calibrations. For newly calibrated sensors use the default values slope = 1.0 and offset = 0.0. The drift correction formula for conductivity is:

(corrected conductivity) =

(corrected conductivity) = slope * (computed conductivity) + offset.

where slope = (true conductivity span) / (instrument conductivity span) offset = (true conductivity - instrument reading) * slope; measured at 0.0 S/m As an example of computing these correction coefficients, if we had the following calibration data:

true conductivity 0.0 S/m 3.5 S/minstrument reading -0.00007 S/m 3.49965 S/mslope = (3.5 - 0.0) / (3.49965 - -0.00007) = +1.000080006offset = (0.0 - -0.00007) * 1.000080006 = +0.000070006

If the span error is less than +/-0.01 then the following approximations are valid: (offset correction) = -(offset error), and (slope correction) = 1.0 / (1.0 + span error).

The conductivity sensor usually drifts by changing span (the slope of the calibration curve). Changes are typically toward lower conductivity readings with time. Offset error in conductivity (error at 0 S/m) is usually due to electronics drift which is usually less than +/- 0.0001 S/m per year. If offsets are greater than +/- 0.0002 S/m it is symptomatic of sensor malfunction. Sea-Bird therefore recommends that drift corrections to conductivity be made by assuming no offset error, unless there is strong evidence to the contrary, or a special need.

Sea-Bird Application Note 31 discusses how to compute slope and offset correction coefficients from preand post-cruise calibrations supplied by Sea-Bird (NRCC), or from salinity bottle samples taken at sea during CTD profiling.

8.17.9.3 PRESSURE

For the pressure sensor you will be prompted for the sensor type (Paroscientific digiquartz or Strain gauge) and serial number.

For the Digiquartz unit, enter the sets of C, D, and T coefficients listed on the calibration certificate. If the higher-order coefficients are not listed, enter zero. The slope term will be equal to 1.0 unless the sensor has been recalibrated by Sea-Bird or NRCC.

12 bit Paros Digiquartz temperature resolution is available for CTDs manufactured after February 1991. The SBE 9 underwater unit configuration sheet will indicate whether your instrument has 12 bit pressure temperature resolution installed. If it is present the correct coefficients for AD590M and AD590B will be on the configuration sheet.

For CTDs with 8 bit Paros temperature resolution: AD590M = 0.0125AD590B = -10.0

For Sensometrics or Paine strain gauge units, enter A0, A1, and A2 coefficients. For older units with strain gauge pressure sensors that only have a linear fit for the pressure calibration, enter the M (A1) and B (A0) coefficients from the pressure calibration sheet. Set A2 to zero.

For either type offset is normally '0' but may be changed to cope with any non-zero sea-surface condition. If the in-air reading is negative, enter an equal positive value, etc.

8.17.9.4 OXYGEN

You will be prompted for the oxygen sensor serial number, m, b, k, c, Soc, Boc, tcor, wt, pcor, and tau. m, b, k, c, tcor, wt, pcor, and tau are found on the Sea-Bird dissolved oxygen sensor calibration sheet. Use the values of Soc and Boc from the most recent calibration.

Run pHfit version 2.0 (included with this version of SEASOFT) using the Vout, pH, and temperature values from your original calibration sheet to compute the new values for offset and slope.

The relationship between the two methods is: pH = pHold + (7 - 2087 / °K)

Slope and offset: Users may wish to "adjust" the fluorometer readings to conform to measured concentrations. For example, from two in-situ samples and with the slope and offset set to 1.0 and 0.0 respectively, a user might observe that SEASOFT indicated a concentration of 0.390 when the concentration determined from a water sample was 0.450, and 0.028 when the concentration determined from a water sample was 0.450, and 0.028 when the concentration determined from a water sample was 0.450. A linear regression to these data would give "slope" = 1.188 and "offset" = -0.013. The introduction of these "fit" coefficients via SEACON would then correct the indicated concentrations. In general, VB, V1 μ g/l, and Vacetone as listed on the original Chelsea factory calibration sheet can be used throughout the life of the instrument, with subsequent calibrations used to adjust slope and offset alone.

Dr Haardt fluorometer (all channels):

Dr. Haardt instruments may have automatic switching between high and low gains. When entering calibration coefficients select 'Output Voltage Level' if the instrument indicates gain by the output voltage level (less thatn 2.5 volts is low gain; greater than 2.5 volts is high gain). Select 'Modulo Bit' if the Dr. Haardt instrument has control lines custom wired to bits in the SBE 9*plus* modulo word. Select 'None' if the Dr. Haardt instrument does not change gain.

Then: 'offset' = - 'scale factor' * voltage/5

Enter the calculated offset into SEACON. Note that the 'offset' and 'scale factor' values may be adjusted as desired to fit a linear regression of fluorometer responses to known chlorophyll *a* concentrations.

<Enter> Modify the Field; <F10> Continue SEAPLOT; <Esc> Quit.

Select the input file path, the input data file and then the plot parameters file. If the input file path is changed the input data file must be reselected.

If you wish to set up new plotting parameters and store them to a new file, make all the selections to the 'Variables to Plot' and 'Misc X-Y Plot Parameters' forms and the press Esc to exit the main set up form. You will then be able to enter the file name for the new display parameters. At this point you may reenter SEAPLOT without exiting to DOS.

Plot Format:

Select One Monochrome X-Y plot, Two or Three Side-by-Side Plots, or Overlaid Multi-Color X-Y Plots.

Plot Label:

The Plot Label will be added at the bottom of X-Y plot. Leave this entry blank if you do not wish to label the plot. The input data file name can be automatically inserted in front of the plot label if the 'Add File Name to the Plot Label' filed in the Misc X-Y Plot Parameters form is set to Yes. Skip:

Set both these fields to 0 if you wish to plot every data point.

Use the arrow keys or the mouse to highlight the Variables to Plot field and press the Enter key. The following form will be displayed:

To change the display highlight the desired field and press the Enter key.

The delete or backspace keys can be used to get rid of unwanted characters while editing a field in the form.

Axis variables:

When the axis variable field is selected a list of the variables in the converted data file will be displayed. Highlight the desired variable and press the Enter to select the variable and write the default label into the label field. Press the Esc key if you do not want to select a variable.

Labels:

Highlight the label field and press Enter to change the label. Press the Esc key when you are finished editing the label to return to the form.

Minimum and Maximum:

To change the minimum and maximum values for the axis highlight the field and either press the Enter key or just start typing in the new value. The minimum and maximum values for the variable in the file will be displayed in teh middle of the form. (Note that if the data file contains data collected while the instrument was in the air the minimum and maximum values will reflect these values. The display of minimum and maximum values is most helpful when displaying bin averaged or sectioned files.)

Major and Minor Divisions:

Highlight the field and either press the Enter key or start typing in the new value. Press Enter or Esc to return to the form. If the variable is plotted on a log scale (fluorescence and PAR) the number of major divisions is log10(maximum/minimum).

Color:

The plotted line types can be connected, dots, or scalable dots. For salable dots a radius of one will plot a standard size dot, a radius of four will plot a dot that is four times as big as a standard dot. Plotting with scalable dots is much slower than plotting with standard dots and will be useful when plotting averaged files or overlaying a sparse data data set on a plot (such as bottle data on a CTD trace).

If automatic paging is set to yes SEAPLOT will draw a new screen each time the Y axis data is greater than the Y axis maximum. The new Y axis minimum will be the previous maximum. The new Y axis maximum will be two times the old maximum minus the old minimum.

If the output selection is plot the data will be sent to the selected plotting device, otherwise the display will be screen dumped.

The screen dump/plot selections are:

WINDOWS 95:

To capture and print a screen dump in Windows 95:

Run SEAPLOT (or SEASAVE) with the command line option -bc5. This changes the background color from black to white.

When printing to a black and white printer set the plot color of all the variables to blue.

Display the data on the screen.

Press <Alt-Printscreen> to capture the display.

Press the Windows button or $\langle Alt-Tab \rangle$ to get to the desktop.

Run Word or WordPad, select Edit, Paste.

For multiple plots edit the plot, leave the editor open, and then press teh MS-DOS prompt on the taskbar to resume SEASAVE. Display the next plot, <Alt-Printscreen>, <Alt-Tab>, position the cursor in the editor and paste the new display.

WINDOWS 3.x:

If SEAPLOT (or SEASAVE) is run in a DOS window the screen can be captured to the Windows Clipboard and then pasted into a windows application:

Select HP LaserJet III when using any printer that supports the HP GL/2 programming language. SEAPLOT assumes that screen dumps are sent to LPT1. Use the Plotter Communication set up form to configure the plotter for COM1, COM2, LPT1, or LPT2.

If COM1 or COM2 is selected SEAPLOT assumes that the plotter supports XON/XOFF software handshaking. If your plotter does not support software handshaking and you wish to use a serial port use the -o filename > command line option to send the output to a file rather than the plotter. To output the file:

- 1. Use the PC to plotter cable defined in the plotter manual.
- 2. Use the DOS mode command to configure the serial port:

will configure COM1 for 9600 baud, no parity, 8 data bits, and one stop bit

2. copy the file to the comm port

Waterfall plots allow the user to plot several files with an offset added to each file. The procedure for displaying and plotting waterfall plots is similar to overlaid plots except that the command line is

seaplot -wfilename

and the first line in the file specifying the list of files to be plotted must contain:

O1 is the amount to separate the X-AXIS #1 variables

O2 is the amount to separate the X-AXIS #2 variables

O3 is the amount to separate the X-AXIS #3 variables

O4 is the amount to separate the X-AXIS #4 variables

The last line must end with a carriage return.

If labels for each file are desired include the keyword LABEL: on the second line and set X-AXIS #1 variable type to none. (A colon ':' must follow LABEL without any spaces.)

If LABEL: is included on the second line and an optional label follows the filename the label will be used, otherwise the file name will be used as the label.

The format of the ASCII data output is selected in the menu for scrolled or fixed display. The variables listed in the scrolled or fixed display menu are output from the port in the order in which they appear.

If you are not using the ASCII output features be sure to set the Output ASCII Data and Send Data to SBE 14 Remote Pressure Display fields to No. If either field is set to Yes SEASAVE will transmit data to the port even if nothing is attached to it.

To change the ASCII data output serial port configuration:

select 'ASCII Data output Port', select the desired COMM port, and then press < Enter >. You will then be able to select the baud rate, parity, and number of stop bits.

If you are sending ASCII data to a line printer you can press <Ctrl-P> to suspend/resume the output.

The remote display output data type can be pressure (with minimum and maximum pressure alarms), altimeter height, or altimeter height alternating with either depth or pressure. If altimeter height alternating with depth/pressure is chosen then pressure/depth is displayed with four digits and altimeter height is displayed with three digits. When using the CTD pressure sensor to control the SBE 11 alarm set 'Enable SBE 11 Deck Unit Alarm on Minimum Pressure' to YES and then select the SBE 11 Deck Unit Alarm Parameters' subform.

The alarm will be enabled when the pressure is greater than the value for:

Number of Seconds Between Screen Updates controls how often data is converted to engineering units and sent to the fixed, scrolled, or X-Y plot displays.

GO 1015:

When the SBE 9 underwater unit detects a bottle confirmation from the GO 1015 it sets a bit in the modulo word high for 1.5 seconds and increments the number of bottles fired. This confirmation bit is used by SEASAVE to keep track of the number of bottles fired.

GO 1016:

If user defined firing sequence is selected you will be prompted for the bottle number to fire each time Ctrl-F3 is pressed. Enter the desired bottle number and press Enter. When the SEASAVE receives a valid position code it sets a bit in the modulo word high for 1.5 seconds and increments the number of bottles fired. Support of the GO 1016 requires SBE 9plus and SBE 11plus modem firmware version 2.0 or greater.

All Water Samplers:

Whenever a bottle confirmation is received by SEASAVE a line is written to the output file with a .BL extension containing the bottle firing sequence number, bottle position, date, time, beginning scan number, and ending scan number for the fired bottle. Scans with the bottle confirmation bit set are written to a file with a .ROS extension when the raw data file is converted by DATCNV.

A list containing the bottles fired will be displayed to the right of the overlaid X-Y plot. A horizontal line will be drawn at the pressure the bottle was fired. The line type, color, and label are selected in the Mark Variable List in the Miscellaneous Run Parameters form. Store Lat/Lon in Raw Data File:

This prompt will appear only if the NMEA interface option is selected in SEACON. The choices are:

Add to Header Only

Lat/Lon/Time is automatically written to the header when data acquisition is started.

Append to Every Scan

Lat/Lon/Time is automatically written to the header and seven bytes of Lat/Lon data will be appended to every scan.

Append to .NAV File when <Ctrl-N> is Pressed

8.24 WFILTER

Wfilter provides 4 types of window filters and a median filter for data smoothing of .CNV files. Window filters calculate a weighted average of data values about a center point and substitute this average for the data value at the center point. The median filter calculates a median for data values about a center point and replaces the data value at the center point with the median.

Filter windows are defined by their length and shape. The minimum window size is 1 scan, the maximum is 511 scans. Window length must be an odd number so that the window has a center point. Window lengths that are specified as an even number are implemented by adding 1 to make the length odd. As mentioned above, a filtered data point is a weighted average of those data points within the window calculated by the transfer function below:

$$y(n) = \sum_{k=-L/2}^{L/2} w(k) \mathbf{x}(n-k)$$

The following window shapes are available: boxcar, cosine, triangle, and gaussian. The figure below shows the impulse response of each of the 4 filter types for a filter of length 17 scans. The impulse response of a filter is obtained by filtering a data set that has zeros everywhere except one data value that is set to 1.



Impulse response of filters. Clockwise from top left: boxcar, cosine, gaussian, triangle. Filter window length is 17 scans.

Filter weights are calculated for each window type with the following equations. After the weights are calculated they are normalized to sum to 1. When a bad data point is encountered the weights are renormalized, excluding the filter element that would operate on the bad data point. In the weight equations below, the following conventions apply:

L is the window length in scans, always an odd number.

n is the window index, running from -L/2 to L/2 with 0 being the center point of the window. w(n) is the set of window weights.

GAUSSIAN FILTER

The gaussian window has parameters of halfwidth (in scans) and offset (in time) in addition to window length. These extra parameters allow data to be filtered and shifted in time relative in one operation. Halfwidth, like window length has units of scans. It determines the width of the gaussian curve. A window length of 9 and a halfwidth of 4 would produce a set of filter weights that fill the window. A window length of 17 and a halfwidth of 4 would produce a set of filter weights that fill only half the window. If the filter weights do not fill the window the offset parameter may be used to shift the weights within the window without clipping the edge of the gaussian curve.

The following figure illustrates the interaction of the three parameters. Window length is 33 and halfwidth is 4. Offset is -3 seconds in the left curve, 0 in the middle curve and +3 seconds in the right curve.

The halfwidth parameter determines the width of the gaussian curve, the offset parameter moves the center of the gaussian filter weights relative to the center point of the window.



Note that the window length is larger than the halfwidth, this allows the complete gaussian curve to be expressed in the window when the offset parameter shifts the curve forward or backward in time. Were the halfwidth specified to be a larger value the trailing edge of the -3 second offset curve would be truncated, the leading edge of the +3 curve would be truncated. The offset parameter moves the gaussian shape of the window weights forward or backward in time. Since the weighted average is calculated for a data value in the center of the window, this has the effect of shifting the data that the filter is operating on forward or backward in time relative to the other data in the file. This capability allows filtering and time shifting to be done in one step.

MEDIAN FILTER

The median filter is not a smoothing filter in the same sense as the window filters described above. For an arbitrary window size a median value is determined, the data value at the center point of the window is replaced by the median value. Median filtering is most useful in spike removal. The figure below shows a data set before and after median filtering.



Salinity versus pressure, left is unfiltered data, right is median filtered with window length 17.

8.25 WILDEDIT

Description:

Marks wild points by setting their values to the bad value specified in the input .CNV header. The first pass obtains an accurate estimate of the data's true standard deviation. The second pass marks values good or bad.

The algorithm is:

- Read in a block of N scans.
- For each column of data, compute the standard deviation of N data points. Flag values that differ from the mean by more than the number of standard deviations specified for pass 1.
- Compute the standard deviation of the same N data points, excluding the flagged values. Mark bad values that differ from the mean by more than the number of standard deviations specified for pass 2.
- Before marking the value bad, check the difference between the value and mean. If this distance is less than the value specified in the form, do not mark the value bad. This is useful when data is from a very slowly changing voltage sensor. Because the voltage channels have limited resolution, the block will have a very small standard deviation, and data that changes by one bit may be incorrectly tagged as wild.
- Repeat until the end of file is reached.
- If the last block of data has less than N scans, use data from the previous scan to fill in the block.

If the data file is particularly corrupted, it may be necessary to run WILDEDIT more than once with different block sizes and number of standard deviations. For example: a 24 scan per second data file obtained from a seven year old reel-to-reel tape contained a large number of dropouts and data errors. Running WILDEDIT three times marked all the "wild" points:

9.3 TMODEM

If you have an SBE 911plus CTD system this program will allow you to test firing water bottles without having to run SEASAVE. Connect the SBE11 RS232 modem serial port to COM port 1 on your computer. Connect the GO 1015 to the top of the SBE 9 underwater unit and connect the SBE 9 to the SBE 11 deck unit. Power on the SBE 11 deck unit and run TMODEM. Press Function Ctrl-F9 to enable the rosette. After 15 seconds you should see the message "#ENABLED" displayed. Press Ctrl-F3 to trip a bottle. The bottle should trip immediately and the message "#CONFIRM" will be displayed. If Function Key Ctrl-F3 is pressed when the rosette is not enabled the control circuit in the SBE 9 underwater unit will enable the rosette and trip the bottle 15 seconds later.

- 1. Your instrument serial number
- 2. The version of the software that was originally shipped with the unit
- 3. The version of the software that you are attempting to run
- 4. A complete description of the problem that you are having

If the problem involves the configuration or set up of the software, in most cases a phone call to the factory will be sufficient to solve the problem. If you phone Sea-Bird we would appreciate it if you would be ready to run the software on a computer during the phone conversation.

For problems that involve the processing of data you may be asked to send a sample of the data to Sea-Bird for evaluation.

If this software was received with a new unit, the instrument configuration was checked at the factory and the software should be set up correctly. If this software is being used with an existing product consult the configuration sheet in the original manual for the instrument type and configuration.

It is intended that Version 4.0 and subsequent versions of the software be run on IBM PC or compatible computer with a HARD DISK.

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
